The end of another volume year gives us an opportunity to look back on an exciting year of the CYS, while we also think ahead to the 5th administrative year of the Association.

This past year in particular gives us a chance to say special thanks to the members who involved in various kinds of activities organized by their chapters' officials. The distribution of the CYS Directory 1994 was carried out in February by individual chapter. The traditional annual reunion dinner, the 3rd Supper, which was hosted by the Hong Kong chapter on July 26, brought some 24 members from the United States, Canada and United Kingdom. The annual CYS Census, which was organized by the International Information Center, successfully verified over 90% of the whole CYS membership. We encourage members to participate, and so, we are leading the effort to make the Association more responsive to the needs of its stakeholders - its members from around the world.

The Spirit of the CYS envisages an Organization actively working to promote friendship among members from around the world. The Association's historic movement to put forward the new electronic mail forwarding system for the CIN (CYS International Network) signalled a new international commitment to the purposes and principles of the Spirit. By the time this Directory is published, the CIN has already become an international entity of 79 members. That means, two out of every three CYS members are using the Internet as one of their communication tools. The demand of a more easy-to-manage and user-friendly networking service has given the birth of the new CIN forwarding system. We must be prepared to deal with changing technologies, and intense demand for improved communication techniques from existing and new services. We must be able to anticipate and respond quickly to changes in our environment. We had decided to suspend publishing the CYS International Newsletter but on the other hand, continue collaboratively working with members of the Association to advancing better and more effective communication and liaison between Association members, chapter chairmen and other Wah Yan alumni in an electronic way.

The CYS, which now comprises an international community of 112 members, embodies our aspirations for achieving the objective of protecting and even further developing means of communications, and promulgating the Spirit of Wah Yan. Like its forerunner, the CYS Directory 1995 also shoulders the same responsibility of promoting communications among CYS members. I would like to acknowledge a very talented team of contributors who worked endless hours to provide materials to this Directory. This publication is an indispensable guide and resources. It provides a uniquely valuable vantage point from which to assess our collective progress towards the goals of the CYS. It is also a sign of the Spirit of the CYS, which has been binding us together from years to years. I doubt if we will still publish the Directory for the next year, but I do hope you find this a useful way to answers to your questions, and a powerful way to find information you can use - whether you are at Wanchai, Hong Kong or Montreal, Quebec.

¹ Mr. Albert H.M. Wei, M.A.Scholar of Mathematics, Computer Science & Engineering, Theoretical & Applied & Engineering Physic. Albert obtained his B.A. degree from the University of Pennsylvania and his M.A. degree from the University of California at Berkeley. He had lived in Repulse Bay for more than ten years but moved to Vancouver, B.C. in the mid 90s of the twentieth century. He was formerly a member of the teaching professions in Wah Yan College Hong Kong, and the success in his teaching career makes him one of the most qualified teachers in the field of secondary education in Hong Kong. He is well known for his teaching, which his students describe as 'clear, well-organized, easy to understand, and above all, helpful to them to get good grades in public examinations'. In November 1994, his professional excellence was recognized by the CYS International Association, which presented him with the Outstanding Teacher Award.

The International Information Center was setup in 1992 aiming to provide worldwide information support to the 112 CYS members around the world. The Center is responsible for maintaining the **CYS DataBase**™, providing contact information for the CYS members and constantly keeping track on members' personal data. Support of the system involves installation of new releases of the software as they become available, managing backups for disaster recovery, and performing monitoring and tuning to maintain database performance.

GWIS System

The IIC is now under the supervision of the GWISE (Global-Wide Information Sharing Systems Operation) at the Computing and Communications Department and is closely cooperated with the Membership Department. The GWISE and the GWEMSO (Global-Wide Electronic Mail System Operation) are both principle research projects carried out by the Center of Communications and the IIC in 1994.

CYS DataBase™

The CYS DataBase, which was developed to handle the membership information for the CYS International Association, was maintained by the IIC under the guidance of the Membership Department. The Database is currently running on the Microsoft Access ver.2.0 platform in the IIC, which provides immense amount of flexibility to the managing unit. However, further research and development is needed to accomplish the advancement of the current technology and methods of communication. The goal of the IIC is to develop a user-friendly and cost-effective information sharing system, which includes the migration of current information resources from PC-oriented computing to UNIX-based computing.

CYS Directory ©

The CYS Directory is published annually by the IIC. In conjunction with the publishing of the Directory, the IIC conducts the CYS Annual Census starting in early-October to late-November. A copy of the DataBase will be subdivided into 6 sections according to 6 different chapters of the Association, up-dated by individual chapter chairmen and recombined to generate an annual report for the Directory, which is published sometime around January every year.

Since its establishment in 1991, the Association has been expanding its services to its members. The CIN was setup in 1992, aiming to provide reliable multilateral communications among members who are doing their college works. The mailing hub of the network is now located at **cys-net@iastate.edu**. The CIN is now maintaining a forwarding list, which is composed of 79 CYS members, at the mailing hub. The hub acts like a postmaster to which mails sent will be automatically delivered to the other CIN members. The membership of the network is still growing steady in these years.

The Global-Wide Electronic Mail (GWEM) System (A Report)

Network Rules and Code of Conduct (see Box 2)

GWEMS Background

Advantages of Sending E-mail

- Fast delivery of information
- Less paperwork
- Geographic independence
- Time zone transparency
- Elimination of unnecessary interruptions
- Improved access to personnel

HARDWARE COMPONENT, The Global-wide Electronic Mail (GWEM) system composes a e-mail account located at Iowa State University which has around 1 MB of disk storage. The storage is donated by Joseph Fung (CYS#05); **SOFTWARE**, Many users dislike the unfriendly interface of the mail facility in the unix system. In view of this, Post Office Protocol (POP) is used in the implementation. POP is one of the most popular implementation in handling unix SMTP mail. POP uses client-server approach. In our implementation, the POP server will route the mails, which are sent to our network hub, **cys-net@iastate.edu**, to the other 79 CIN members around the world. The time need for forwarding an e-mail depends greatly upon the processing time required in different local machines.

The CIN Mailing Hub

The Mailing Hub has been moved to **cys-net@iastate.edu**. Other than the new Global-Wide Electronic Mail (GWEM) System, which is implemented in autumn, 1994 by the concerted effort of the CYS International Network and the CYS International Information Center, the hub is now also maintaining three other forwarding system for special missions. We are also expecting additional research and development of the automation of the daily routines of the Hub, due for completion later in 1995.

Services Provided

The Mailing Hub offers a comprehensive e-mail forwarding service to all CIN members. Services include monthly up-date of the CIN members list and batch processing of e-mail within the network. Our Mailing Hub operates 24 hours a day, 7 days a week. It will however be running unattended on selected vocations. The Hub is also responsible for maintaining 3 other forwarding systems which provide specific services to the 1) communications among chapter chairmen, 2) registration of new CIN applications, and 3) CIN routine testing.

Help Desk

A Help Desk service is available to provide consultancy to our users. Its main purposes are to direct users to relevant information, to guide inexperienced UNIX users and to give suggestions on solving problems. The Help Desk is located at **cin-help@iastate.edu**. Our staff will try their best to answer queries from our users in e-mails.

The CIN Press Office

We have set up the CIN Press Office to channel announcements from official sources. The Office is also responsible for scanning the e-mails circulated in the network and making sure that members are abiding to the CIN Network Rule and Code of Conduct.

Box 2: CIN Network Rules / Code of Conduct

The CIN Network Rules and Code of Conduct was adopted in 1992, shortly after the Network was established. This document was drafted by our former Chairman, Edward Jan (CYS#01).

NETWORK RULES / CODE OF CONDUCT

- 1) This is not a democracy. You are our guest and you are expected to act as a good and gracious user. You may expect the same treatment in return. By using this network, it is understood that you agree to all these rules.
- 2) This network is not for questionable or illegal activities. We do not approve of software piracy. When in doubt, rule 1 applies.
- 3) NON-CYS MEMBERS are STRICTLY prohibited to mail to CIN unless they have been granted permission from the CIN coordinator.
- 4) There are expressions that are not considered polite in society. These will not be used here either. We will not bitch about an occasional Damn or so, but careful. When in doubt, rule 1 applies.
- 5) You agree not to deliberately insult, slander, degrade or belittle any other user. You agree that each other user has a right to have an opinion and express it and is not expected to change. You agree to not be too easily bothered or provoked by any other user. Let the CIN coordinator know about any abuse and it will be investigated and dealt with! Rule 1 applies.

The penalty for not following the rules are simple:

First offense, you get a warning.

Second offense, your privileges are reduced.

Third offense, you are banned from the network.

- 1) To re-instate normal privileges for a minor infraction, you would be required to pay US\$5.00.
- 2) To re-instate for major infraction you would be required to pay an application fee of US\$10.00 and petition the CIN coordinator in writing.
- 3) You may appeal to the CIN if you think that you have been judged inappropriately.

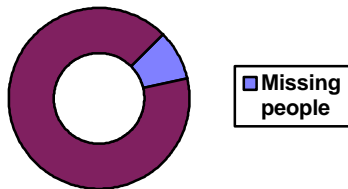
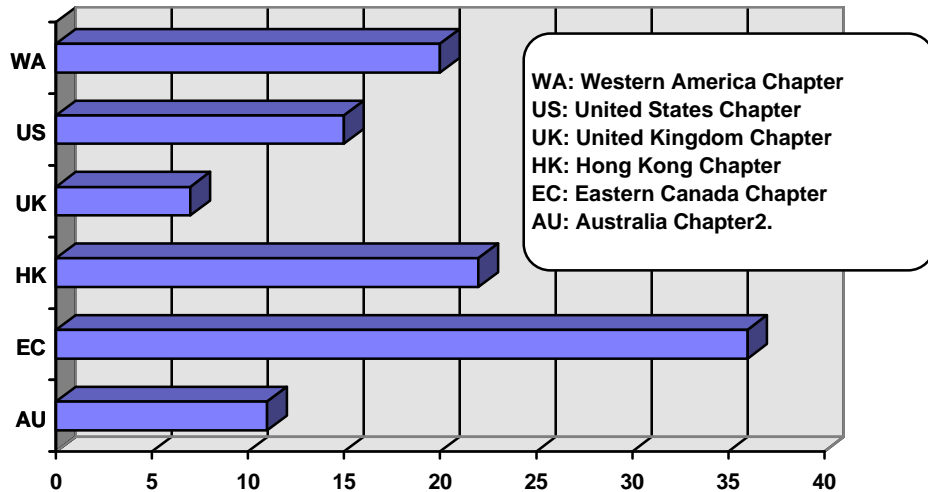

Two World-Wide Web servers are now being maintained by CYS members. One is the CYS Computing and Communication WWW Server, at <http://www.public.iastate.edu/~cys05>. It is constructed by **Joseph Fung**. The other one is at <http://www.cs.wisc.edu/~mak/mak.html>. It is constructed by **Newton Mak**.

Box 3: CYS FTP Server Uptime

FTP, or File Transfer Protocol, is a way of sending files between computers under the TCP/IP technology. Using the FTP protocol, you can get the file you need with a few simple commands.

The CYS Anonymous FTP Server was setup in January, 1994 at the Iowa State University. During the past year, users in the CIN transmitted 24143 files. There are now 86 files cataloged into 21 directories in the server, and the total disk space used is 2.56 megabytes (approx.). Total number of connections counted is 240 by December 2, 1994.

Members connecting to the FTP Server mostly retrieve files relating to the CYS and the WYPSA. However, starting from autumn, 1994, since most of the labor-power of the C & C Department was channeled to the projects dealing with the CIN and the World-Wide Web Server, the FTP Server can now remain very limited services to its users. The recently project concerning it is to provide a direct link between the WWW Server and itself so that personnel can be used more efficiently in the Department.

To use the Server, open a ftp connection to **las1.iastate.edu**, and then enter **anonymous.cys05** as the username and your **CYS membership number** as the password (e.g. cys#05). Please consult your local computer technicians on how to use ftp comments.

The FTP Server was monitored and managed by Joseph Fung (CYS#05). For comments or suggestions, please send electronic mail to cys05@iastate.edu.
